A BRIGHTER FUTURE FOR ETHNIC CHILDREN– LAOS

Laos is one of the poorest countries in the world with low standard of education and health services. In the rural areas where the ethnic groups live, the situation is even worse. Most of the ethnic children quit school before finishing primary school due to financial difficulties. Many of them have to work at a very young age to support their



families. Their parents are all illiterate, so they do not know how to educate and guide their children.

Being in the missionary land of Laos for over ten years, the RNDM sisters wish to bring light and hope to the poor, especially to the children. However, being a new mission, it requires financial support. Through this project we have provided the girls with the basic needs to attend school and are helping them to understand the importance of education and personal development. This year, we have three girls at teacher training college and seven in high school. Three girls have completed their high school program and are preparing for their admission to university. Other girls are working towards achieving their final results at high school. We are really proud that the girls are happy and have become more confident and sociable. They also have the opportunity to meet many people, learn music, English and various skills. We are grateful for your generosity and care for our girls, who have the chance to study and have a brighter future.

KAINWATER HARVESTING AT CHERRAPUNJEE

Cherrapunjee in North East India, is known for the heaviest rainfall in the world and yet no one could imagine, that the children of St. John Bosco orphanage do not have sufficient drinking water for a long time. As rain pours down from the sky, it goes down to the drains and rivers, because the school lacked big water reservoirs.

It is like a dream come true for them to have such a big water tank in the compound; thanks to the Christmas gift that made a difference to their lives. The students feel that they are truly blessed by God to get enough rain that fills the reservoirs. Earlier, though there was

heavy rain, they had no way to collect the water. The children had to walk miles with their pots and buckets to fetch water from the river. This has caused health and sanitation problems for the girls as well as affected their academic performance.

Access to potable water has been proven to boost health, education and quality of life. This has been true for them, since the installation of the water tanks. The children have improved in their studies and are looking happier and healthier. Our words are not enough to express our gratitude to you dear benefactors, but we offer you our heartfelt thanks and pray daily to Almighty God to bless you abundantly.



John Musau's story

John Musau and his sister were born with brittle bone disease and are severely incapacitated. John is the second born in a family of eight. His mother encouraged him to study and carried him to school every day. He completed the primary school. He achieved grades and qualified for Secondary School, but he could not find a right place within the vicinity to avoid long distance travel. When he heard that it would not be possible to begin Secondary school, his immediate request was, 'Can you find me a technical course?

This was quite a challenge. We began looking at schools which has a special unit for those with physical disability and tried to match the courses with his particular interest in electronics. As a primary school student he had gained a reputation for repairing radios. Finally, we were directed by the Parish Chairman to Matuu Youth Polytechnic which has provision for those with disability.

John was given the chance to focus on electronics and follow the whole course together with work experience in an electronics firm. He was immediately welcomed by fellow students who willingly accepted the role of 'driver'. He has a very outgoing personality and soon fitted in to the new environment. His dream was to learn new skills and achieve a Certificate.

John is very grateful to RNDM Sisters for the chance to learn this trade. John's sister has learned knitting and is able to make dresses, thus becoming self-supportive.
