## **PPE Gift for Matuu Health Center – KENYA**

#### Dear Benefactors,

Covid-19 Pandemic affected the whole world especially those who are working in health sectors. It has been highly risky for doctors, nurses and health workers. They needed to be protected first, in order to give service to others. The cost of personal protective equipment (PPE) was very high and this put us in a dilemma, whether to retrench some staff in order to

buy PPE or buy some drugs to save the lives of people. God of the widow of Naim came to our help through the Christmas Catalogue Funds and we were able to purchase enough PPE kits and the necessary drugs for our health center.

We offer our sincere gratitude to all our Sisters and donors for their generous support. # **Education in the remote villages - MYANMAR**

Htamin Htoke is a very remote village that belongs to Ann Parish in Rakhine State, Myanmar. It is very difficult to reach this place, especially in the rainy season. Since there is no other school in this village, the children have to go to the nearby village school by crossing a bamboo-made suspension bridge over the creek which is very dangerous during rain and times of flood.

There are about 30 families settled in this village, belonging to the Chin ethnic group. Being a Catholic village, there is a small Church and a priest who lives there. The villagers are materially very poor but their belief in God is quite strong. There are over 50 children who have no access to any schooling, nor have a village library or any other opportunity for education. Understanding their situation, the RNDM Sisters visit the village, taking a leading part in teaching catechism, conducting classes and other activities, in which the children participate enthusiastically. The Sisters sensed their eagerness to learn and encouraged the villagers to educate their children for a brighter future.

With the support of the Solidarity funds, the Sisters arranged the study classes for children. We bought books and stationery



items, teaching aids, school uniforms and provided them with nutritious food. The happiness and smiles on the faces of the children in receiving such needy support was boundless.

Though our target was only Htamin Htoke village, at the request of the priest, we also went to 'Thaywal' village, about 35 miles away from Ann town, shared some food items and school stationaries to a total of 120 children in all. The Sisters had to stop their mission due to the civil unrest and Covid lockdown, but hope to continue later. We remain ever grateful for the support received from the RNDM Sisters and the generous donors!

### EDUCATION FOR TRIBAL CHILDREN & WOMEN EMPOWERMENT Kuchinda - Central India

Dear friends and benefactors

I would like to express our deep gratitude to all of you for the generous support that enabled us to provide survival kits and enabling the women empowerment program at Kuchinda, Odisha, India.

The RNDM sisters in Kuchinda began this mission in 2015 empowering women and helping the primary school children with tuition classes. Due to the poor education system of this State, the Sisters responded to the needs of educating children through forming a number of



Supplementary Education Centres (SEC). It was a great success and we were able to strengthen the SECs in different villages by imparting quality education to the rural children.

It was a great challenge for us to continue the Centers in the villages during the Covid-19 pandemic and the lockdown times. The children were left like sheep without a shepherd for a few months. Later at the request of the parents and with the support of the village leaders, the Centers were re-opened taking all safety measures and following the Covid-19 protocol imposed by the Government and conducted classes in the open spaces. The Sisters in Kuchinda made great efforts to stitch over 2000 masks for the people in the locality. Masks were distributed to all including children, their family members and at the quarantine Centers.



We organized a one-day seminar for the instructors on health and hygiene to help children, their families and the local people of the area.

A pride walk was organized on the theme, '**Dignity and Justice'** to mark the International Women's Day celebrations. There were about 80 women belonging to different villages who participated in it. It was a rejuvenating experience for all.

Due to the lockdown women were not able to come to the Center for training, therefore, we ventured into a new mission of Mobile Tailoring in the month of December 2020 in a village called Jhalibahal. There were 7 girls who enrolled from a nearby

village and completed the tailoring in May 2021. Among them four of the women bought new sewing machines and began to earn their living.

We are hopeful to see brighter days and we thank all our Sisters, donors and friends for helping us to continue educating tribal children and empowering women, making them self-confident and selfsufficient.

We appreciate your generosity and may God bless you always.
