The establishment of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) in 2019 aimed to address historical grievances and promote self-governance among these communities, while various initiatives strive to empower and uplift the rights and cultures of indigenous peoples.

The RNDM Sisters in the Philippines



Sisters established **RNDM** missionary involvement in the Philippines in October 1987. With the invitation of the Archbishop of Cotabato Philip Smith, OMI, DD and local leader, Sultan Tagenek Dakias, two pioneer Sisters, coming from Bangladesh (Sr. Shanti Rozario, RNDM) and India (Sr. Andrea Sawian, RNDM), began their work among the indigenous people known as the Menubu Dulangan in Senator Ninoy Aquino (formerly Kulaman) in Sultan Kudarat, Mindanao. This ministry, with its components in education, health, and livelihood, continues to this day. In the years that followed, the missionary endeavors of the Sisters have expanded, with eight Filipinas joining the Congregation and RNDMs from various parts of the world being assigned to different ministries in the Philippines.

For many years, the Philippines has also served as a place for formation and study for numerous RNDMs worldwide. Currently, we have communities in three dioceses: the Archdioceses of Cotabato, Cubao, and Davao. Our primary ministries focus on indigenous peoples' justice advocacy and solidarity, peacebuilding, education, and spiritual accompaniment.

The logo of the Philippine Region features the bamboo, symbolizing the resilience of Filipino people amidst diversity and challenges. It also signifies the flourishing of RNDM life and mission in the Philippines.
