Social Analysis



The session on Social Analysis was conducted by Sr. Oliva Saldana RNDM to help us understand the reality of life in families, societies, and communities. We are called to bring the reign of God, to see everyone through God's eyes, and to promote justice and equality in the



workplace. People's participation is essential; we should not differentiate people, but rather respect their beliefs and cultures. Our goal should be to create a harmonious and lasting impact on

people's hearts. It is important to remember that success is not always guaranteed, because failure also may occur, but we must remain firm in our mission. Social work empowers people, communities, and societies. As Martin Luther King Jr. said, "Everyone can be great, because everyone can serve." Social work can contribute goodness and light, helping people to see hope rather than despair. Communication and Conflict resolution Skills
